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AARP Awards 2021 Community Challenge Grant to the Jersey City Housing Authority

The grant will be used to increase digital equity among public housing residents in Jersey City

NEW BRUNSWICK, NJ (July 28, 2021) – The Jersey City Housing Authority has been named a recipient of a 2021 AARP Community Challenge grant, one of five grantees selected in New Jersey.

Digital inclusion is one of the Jersey City Housing Authority's main areas of focus in light of national and local data that show extreme disparities in digital access among public housing residents compared to the general population. The Jersey City Housing Authority became a participant in HUD's ConnectHome USA Initiative in late 2018 and has since partnered with organizations to provide hundreds of residents with devices and hotspots, establish on-site computer labs at four developments, and host dozens of digital literacy classes.

The AARP Community Challenge Grant will expand on the digital inclusion initiative by increasing digital equity among residents in in a senior-only public housing development in Jersey City. The project will provide WiFi, smart home devices, a computer lab, and digital literacy programming to reduce social isolation, bridge language barriers and create sustainable, on-site digital programming.

"Nationally, only one-third of public housing residents have internet access, and for most that is through a cell phone connection," said Vivian Brady-Phillips, Executive Director of the Jersey City Housing Authority. "The AARP Community Challenge grant will allow 50 low-income JCHA households — some of the most isolated during the pandemic — to get connected, enabling them to access online education, utilize telehealth services, connect with family and friends virtually, and better engage in civic and political activities."

This project is part of the largest group of grantees to date with \$3.2 million awarded among 244 organizations nationwide. Grantees will implement quick-action projects to promote livable communities by improving housing, transportation, public spaces, civic engagement, and connection with family, friends, and neighbors with an emphasis on the needs of the 50-plus. Many of this year's awards support revitalizing communities adversely impacted by the pandemic and include a focus on diversity, inclusion, and disparities.

All projects are expected to be completed by November 10, 2021, and are designed to achieve one or more of the following outcomes:

• Create vibrant public places by improving open spaces and parks and activating main streets.

- **Deliver a range of transportation and mobility options** by increasing connectivity, walkability, bikeability, wayfinding, and access a wider range of transportation choices.
- Encourage the availability of a range of housing by increasing accessible and affordable housing solutions.
- **Increase civic engagement** by bringing together residents and local leaders to address challenges and facilitate a greater sense of inclusion.
- Ensure a focus on diversity and inclusion while improving the built and social environment of a community.
- **Support local recovery from the coronavirus pandemic** by emphasizing economic development, improvements to public spaces, and transportation services.

"We are incredibly excited to support the Jersey City Housing Authority as they work to make immediate improvements in their community to encourage promising ideas and jumpstart long-term change," shared Stephanie Hunsinger, AARP New Jersey State Director. "Our goal at AARP New Jersey is to support the efforts of our communities to be great places for people of all backgrounds, ages and abilities."
